Hubby and I returned home February 28 after a journey through Panama and Costa Rica for a month and a half. Our souls were filled with tropical forests, plants, and birds.

We arrived home to spring already underway in the Lower Mainland. Crocuses, daffodils, hellebores, camellias, and so much more are already on display in our garden.

The hellebores in our garden are reaching for the sky! These plants truly are the jewels of winter and spring. They were just starting to bloom when we left for Central America mid-January.

Hellebores should be in every Canadian garden! These evergreen perennials can grow in zone 3 to zone 9.

They enjoy dappled shade — although we have some in growing happily in full morning sun at this time of year. Their evergreen leaves provide interest all year round.

Braving the chill, hellebores are hardy, compact, and low maintenance. Their flowers produce valuable nectar for early pollinators (already spotted buzzing around in the Lower Mainland).

The best time to plant hellebores in your garden is from autumn to spring in moist, free-draining soil.

The plants can be divided in early autumn or can be grown from seed. *Helleborus x hybridus* are usually long-lived plants, so are reinvigorated when divided. I also add a generous layer of mulch over the soil in the fall.

Newly planted hellebores need additional watering during their first growing season, from spring to summer.

While my hellebores are showing off their pretty, nodding blooms, I will prune back some of the leaves to give them plenty of room to dazzle the eyes.

Even after experiencing an array of dazzling tropical blossoms, nothing compares to the joy of coming home to the rich colours of our own gardens.

Dear members of the Scholarship Fund Committee,

Thank you for supporting the scholarship awards for horticulture and gardening students across British Columbia and, specifically, for supporting the program at the Pacific Horticulture College in Saanich. I recently completed the full-time Pacific Horticulture College foundations program in November and I received a sponsored award for Excellence in Landscape Design. I applied to the program as a way to start a second career following a 30+ year career in the Canadian Armed Forces. The program was excellent and I found that working outside in the gardens reinvigorated my sense of awe in the natural world. It also gave me the opportunity to work with a small group of instructors and fellow students who are passionate about plants. I plan on working in the landscape maintenance field for the next few months to gain some experience before pursuing further education in landscape design. Your recognition of student achievement in these programs brings significance to the effort we put in to our course work.

Your gift keeps students housed, fed, and on the move!

We have completed a very successful year with \$13,500 awarded in scholarships in 2025. The final reports are just coming in from the academic institutions and the details will be in the next *Bulletin*. We blew past our goal of \$10,000 in donations with a total of \$14,035.40 received from groups and individuals across the province in 2025. Thank you so much for your generosity!

Students are struggling with the high costs of living. No student should have to decide between rent and textbooks. Our individual awards make a big difference but they are relatively modest, ranging from \$200 to \$1,900, depending on the cost and length of the program that the student is enrolled in. Our goal for 2026 is to increase these awards, particularly the ones that are on the lower end of the scale. And for that, we need your help! 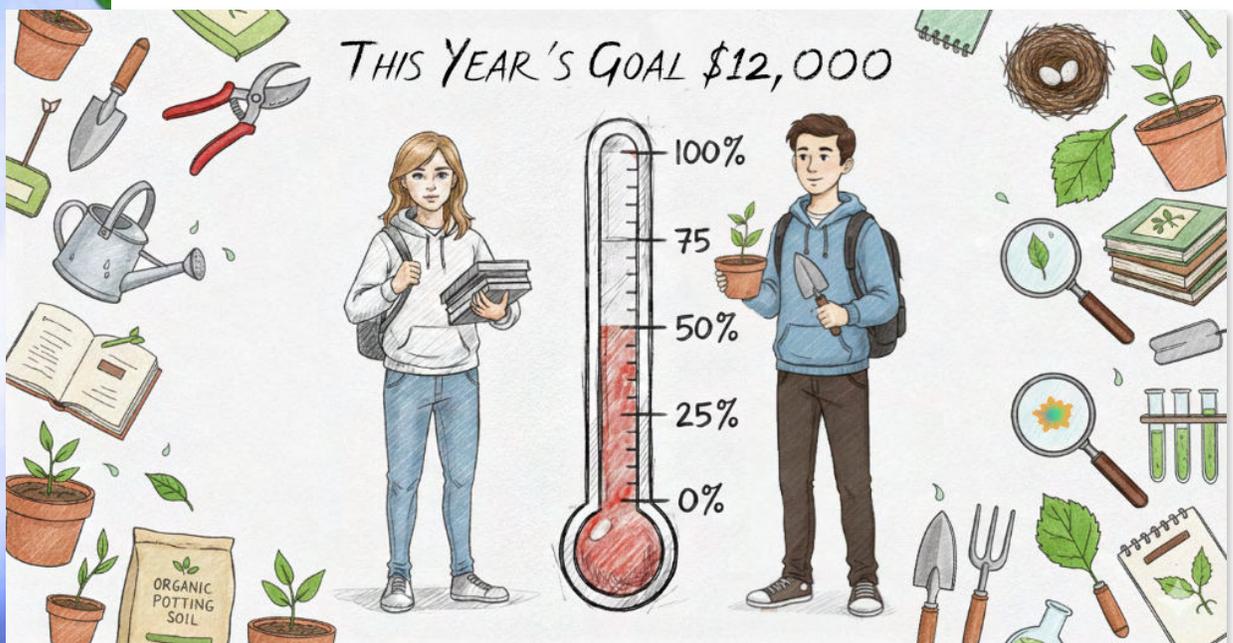

Highlights of the position include receiving thank-you notes from the students and attending the ceremonies where the scholarships are awarded.

You would take on the role of committee secretary for the first year of the term, then treasurer for the second, and finally chair for the third. Lots of support is available from the other committee members, and we greatly enjoy the work we do!

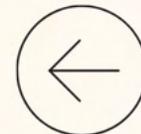

DANA CROMIE, KEYNOTE SPEAKER
“EDUCATION OF A PLANTAHOLIC — HOW I CAME TO LEARN ABOUT PLANTS AND
GARDENING”**

Dana is a lifelong Instituto artist and gardener living in Vancouver, British Columbia.

Dana studied Visual Art at Capilano College, Instituto Allende de San Miguel, and the Vancouver School of Art. He then worked in clothing manufacturing as a production manager and as a planner.

The son of a green thumb and ardent volunteer, Dana has a renowned garden full of unusual plants. Dana has a deep engagement with the local gardening community, and his garden has been toured multiple times by the Alpine Garden Club of BC, the Vancouver Rhododendron Society, and the Vancouver Hardy Plant Group.

Dana wrote and photographed ‘In My Garden’ for *Vancouver Lifestyle Magazine* from 1999-2001 and has contributed to the *Annual* of the Rhododendron Species Foundation and the *Bulletin* of the Alpine Garden Club of BC.

After retiring, he became a Friend of the UBC Botanical Garden where he was head of the FOGs’ guides and coordinator of their various propagation units. Dana coordinated the acquisition and catalogue descriptions of the plants for the UBCBG Collectors’ Plant Auctions

from 2004 - 2011. Dana has been chair of the UBCBG Treasured Bulb Sale since 2015.

He has studied botanical illustration at UBC Botanical Garden with Alison Watt, at Emily Carr University with Elizabeth Mancini, and privately with Mary Comber Miles.

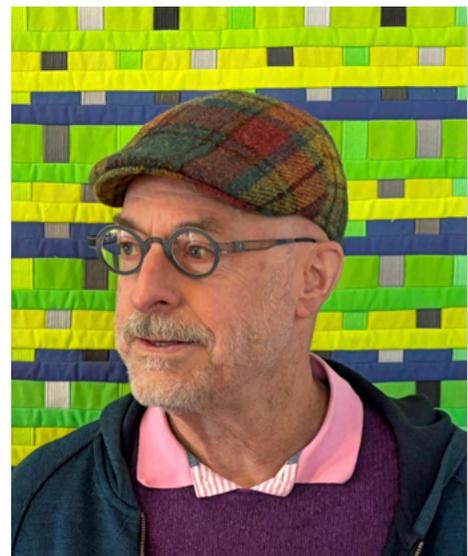
From 2012-2014, Dana was Artist in Residence at UBC Botanical Garden.

2018-2025, Dana was co-chair of the Vancouver Hardy Plant Group, and co-chaired their 2023 Hardy Plant Study Weekend, which is a conference that rotates between Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle, and Portland.

Dana is a regular judge at the Vancouver Island Rock and Garden Society spring show.

He has travelled widely to visit plants in situ, including five weeks in Chile in 2025.

He lives in East Vancouver with his husband, Greg Brown.

Gardening is an excellent low-impact exercise for seniors that improves flexibility, strength, and cardiovascular health while boosting Vitamin D and reducing stress. It offers cognitive stimulation and sense of purpose. Volunteering in allotment gardens and other community-based gardens also gives an important connection to like-minded people and gives a sense of belonging.

Key health benefits:

- ♥ Gardening tasks like digging and weeding build muscle strength and dexterity.
- ♥ Regular gardening can improve bone density, reduce blood pressure, and burn 200-400 calories per hour.
